The Cost for Comfort is Freedom

Life is full of meaning, miracles, and diversity, but if that was all stripped away for our safety would that be a world that was living in. In the utopian story of *The Giver* by Lois Lowery they explore how in the comfort of ignorance without memories, there can be no true emotion and a lack of wisdom.

The entire community that Jonas lives in is a content community. They enjoy their special celebrations, school, and being with their guardians. Everything is the same and that is how they wanted it. As the giver but it "Our people made that choice, the choice to go to Sameness". The people were scared of how the world used to be; full of starvation, war, and differences that made people feel bad. What the community does not understand is that being different is amazing and that no matter what you do you can not protect everyone's feelings, because feelings are what makes us people and grow us. Wars and starvation may be reasons to call for a more unified government but the lengths that they went to were unrealistic. Making any form of conflict similar to that of war.

These content people that state they are happy, have never felt true happiness.
